Thought for the Week

Jesus, Friend of Outcasts

Mark 2: 13-17

Then Jesus went out to the lakeshore again and taught the crowds that gathered around him. As he walked along, he saw Levi son of Alphaeus sitting at his tax-collection booth. "Come, be my disciple," Jesus said to him. So Levi got up and followed him. That night Levi invited Jesus and his disciples to be his dinner guests, along with his fellow tax collectors and many other notorious sinners. (There were many people of this kind among the crowds that followed Jesus.) But when some of the teachers of religious law who were Pharisees saw him eating with people like this, they said to his disciples, "Why does he eat with such scum?"

When Jesus heard this, he told them, “Healthy people don’t need a doctor – sick people do. I have come to call sinners, not those who think they are already good enough.” (New Living Translation)

Albert was a well known minister in Holland. He was asked to conduct a major ecumenical service for Easter in the largest church in Amsterdam. He looked round for some way of trying to convey the thrill and excitement of Resurrection.

He hit upon the idea of a trumpeter improvising on the theme of Resurrection.

Improvisation was important: it was about rising from the dead. He tried the major orchestra in the city but the trumpeter there would not think of sinking to improvisation. So, on the advice of one of his younger church members, he went to a night club and found a genius trumpeter. The man agreed to play.

On Easter Sunday he did indeed play. Starting from a low, groaning note he built up to an almighty crescendo of sound. They had never heard anything like it before. It was moving, wonderful and magnificent.

Later that week Albert went round to pay the man. ‘Who were those people in church on Sunday?’, the man asked, ‘Unlike the people here, they listened, they appreciated, they understood.’ Albert explained that these were the people of God at worship. ‘Tell me more’, said the man, ‘I don’t know anything about all this.’

They met three or four times. They talked about the Gospel, about God and about Jesus, they talked about the promises and the demands of God. ‘I think I would like to be baptised’, said the man.

Albert told the story to the Elders meeting. ‘Wonderful’, they said, ‘But he will stop playing his trumpet in that nasty night club, won’t he?’

Urgent request from the Ukraine Church in Leicester

Thank you for the continuing donations for the Ukrainian people – not just those on the front line but also the families who have arrived in Leicester and who are being helped to start a new life here in Leicestershire by the existing Ukrainian families.

As a result the items that are required is changing and at the moment the following is the list of the most urgently needed items :-

Tinned meat and fish (ham, spam, corned beef, sardines, tuna, mackerel)

Soup – small tins if possible – Cup-a-Soups

Easy to make with boiling water meals as well as pasta, rice, etc.

In addition medical items are required but these must be in date and NO prescription medication can be accepted.

Following an introduction we heard a testimony from a local rugby player about how he came to give his life to the Lord during his playing career and the ups and downs of being a Christian in those circumstances. He spoke well and his story was moving and inspiring.


